Foreign Languages

Foreign languages represent an important part of the traditional liberal arts curriculum that is increasingly relevant in the interdependent global community of the twenty-first century. Knowledge of one or more foreign languages is a valuable asset for students considering graduate school or seeking employment in the international field. Students at The New School have the opportunity to study more than 12 foreign languages at levels from beginner to advanced.

Foreign Languages at The New School are offered as part of:

- 1. The Undergraduate Degree program (4-credit language courses, which meet twice a week for 100 minutes per class during the day)
- 2. The Continuing Education program:
 - once a week for three hours and forty five minutes (13 sessions 0 or 4 credits)
 - twice a week for one hour fifty minutes (26 sessions 0 or 4 credits)
 - once a week for one hour fifty minutes (13 sessions 0 or 2 credits)
 - once a week for one hour fifty minutes (15 sessions 0 or 3 credits)
 - combination course meeting some sessions onsite once a week for one hour fifty minutes and some sessions online (15 sessions – 0 or 3 credits)
 - 14 hours over one weekend (3 days non-credit)

Degree students interested in Arabic, Chinese, French, Italian, Japanese, Latin, or Spanish should, whenever possible, register for 4-credit courses. Degree students interested in languages only offered through the Adult Education program (i.e. German, Portuguese, Russian, Sign Language, Yiddish) may register for courses offered through the continuing education program.

Placement in the appropriate level:

- Students who have studied a language in high school or college can place themselves in the appropriate level by using the following formula: one year of high school foreign language equals one semester of foreign language study at the college level. For example, a student who has completed one year of high school Spanish should enroll in Spanish 2.
- Students with questions or with reason to believe that this does not accurately measure their knowledge of a foreign language (e.g., it has been several years since they last studied the language) should either call (212.229.5676) or email (foreignlanguages@newschool.edu) the Department office to set up an appointment to discuss alternate placement and/or take a placement test.

Before traveling to the Middle East, stop at The New School for a weekend immersion in Levantine Arabic. Master common situations such as asking for directions, handling currency, ordering in restaurants and shopping. Make rapid progress learning to converse in Levantine Arabic. Level I is for complete beginners; Level 2 is for students familiar with basic elements of the language. No prior knowledge of Modern Standard Arabic required. Since the focus of this course is conversation, phonetic transliterations will be used. Each workshop meets Friday, 6:00-9:30 p.m., Saturday 10 a.m.- 5 p.m. (with a one-hour lunch break); and Sunday, 10:30 a.m.-3:00p.m., for a total of 14 hours of instruction. *(noncredit)*

This advanced conversation course explores the Parisian way of life and gives students a unique opportunity to understand what it means to love Paris. The essence of Paris will gradually reveal itself to the students who will embark on a voyage into the aesthetics of French culture from architecture to food and fashion. Each week of class will focus on a new aspect of life in the city of Paris: Architecture, Café Culture, Food, Love, Visual Aesthetics, Liberty, etc. Students will view and discuss authentic materials, which will serve as an empirical frame for discovery, understanding and appreciation. How does the Café culture influence Parisians' lives? What does Paris's architecture tell us about its history? Why is visual aesthetics such a key element in French culture? What do liberty, equality, fraternity mean in Paris today? These are some of the questions that students will consider and try to answer throughout the course. At the end of their voyage, they will present a multi-media project to the class. This class is entirely conducted in French. Prerequisite: French 5, the equivalent, or permission of the instructor (0 or 2 credits)

The course begins with a review of these structures and moves on to more complex grammatical forms such as the subjunctive and conditional tenses and relative pronouns. Particular attention is paid to developing students' ability to understand spoken Portuguese and to converse on topics pertaining to different times and places. (*O or 2 credits*)

Portuguese for Spanish Speakers

The emphasis is on eliminating Spanish phonetics, vocabulary, and sentence structure from their Portuguese speech. (*O or 2 credits*)

This course introduces the culture and communication methods of the contemporary deaf community, focusing on the experience of navigating social interactions using signs, gestures, and visual cues. Topics explored and practiced include the psychology of deafness, finger spelling, the art of interpreting, and the silent speech of body language. At the end of the course, students complete a final project, considering a particular aspect of the language and culture of the deaf and hard of hearing. (*0 or 2 credits*)

Students master the techniques essential to ASL conversations, including fingerspelling and facial expressions. Through demonstrations and class activities, including interactive exercises and role-playing, students gain familiarity with ASL on a beginner's level, and a general understanding of the history of deaf society in the United States. This course is led by a deaf native signer. There is no prerequisite for this course. (0 or 2 credits)
